Is it political, or is it Biblical??

Is it political, or is it Biblical?? This is a question that I ask frequently. I ask this question because I've been around congregations long enough to know that people usually don't want to hear politics from the pulpit. Like those many people, I don't think the pulpit is the place for politics. I ask the is-it-political-or-Biblical question because of the issues bubbling and boiling on the surface of our national life. Racism, human sexuality, vile public discourse, and immigration are a few that come to mind. I have to ask the political or Biblical question because in addition to being issues that surface in public life, the Bible also speaks to these concerns.

Preaching has always been a challenge for me. But it has been even more challenging because sometimes the issues raised in the lessons assigned for Sunday worship are the exact same volatile issues that are in the news.

There's immigration. Immigration isn't just an issue for us here in the United States. Countries in the European Union also struggle with immigration, many as people have fled war and oppression. People from Ukraine, South Sudan, and Palestine seek refuge from political turmoil, war, poverty and hunger. The details of immigration policies are addressed by national governments through political processes.

While that is true, the Bible is not silent about

immigration. In Leviticus 19.33, "When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the alien. The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord." These verses are part of the holiness code for living as God's faithful people. The entire Bible is a story of immigration.

In the parable of the good Samaritan (Luke 10.25-37), Jesus responds to the question of who is a neighbor by first defining a neighbor as anyone in need. Jesus then describes what a neighbor does, a neighbor helps those in need. In the pages of scripture, God always takes the side of the vulnerable. The Bible teaches that God's people are advocates for those in need, be they immigrants, or the working poor, or those who are oppressed by racist thinking.

The Bible doesn't tell us how to fix an immigration process in need of reform, it just tells us to care for those in our midst. The Bible doesn't tell us how to tame racism, or sexism, or other ism's lurking, it just tells us that in God's eyes all are equal, rich and poor, men and women, black or brown, cis or trans. The Bible doesn't tell us how to upgrade our public discourse, it just tells us to use our words to honor God and to build one another up. The Bible teaches God's ways and shapes our values.

As believers and as citizens we then express our values and encourage action in public space through the democratic processes available to us.

All this is to say, the next time you wonder if I'm getting a little political, it just might be my humble efforts to be Biblical. Thank you for your patience as I try to honor a fine line and still be a faithful Biblical preacher.

•Stewardship & Finance – Met last March 3. Laurie Shultz is chair for committee this year. Discuss how to get more people involved in both volunteering, worship & other leadership options, and active financial support of St. Peter ministry plan. Council members and other leaders need to be seen volunteering in multiple ways, to encourage everyone else to also be involved. Memorial giving list was initially approved, but only two items have actual cost estimates – need that for all items on this list, and Keith encouraged thinking of other additions to add. This is a “living list”: we expect updates (as things are funded or needs change over time). Keith reviewed the church’s gift acceptance policy related to how unrestricted gifts are to be allocated. *LSI serves Iowans of all ages; from families with newborns navigating parenthood, to Refugee and Immigrant elders, and children of all ages. One of the most vital populations LSI supports is young parents, especially those navigating the challenges of early motherhood. Cheyenne F., a Family Support Specialist for LSI's Healthy Families America (HOPES) program, shares the impactful work she's doing with young mothers in need of support.*

She shares that she had the privilege of working closely with NF, a young mom who has shown incredible growth and resilience.

The Healthy Families America (HOPES) program is an evidence-based child abuse prevention program that provides support to prenatal families and families with children ages 0-5. LSI's Family Support Specialists work with families like NF's to provide the guidance and resources needed to break cycles of abuse and neglect and build strong, healthy foundations for children and parents alike.

NF's journey began in June 2023 when she reached out for help. At 19 years old and pregnant, NF was living in Muscatine County and knew she needed extra parenting support. Through the HOPES program, Cheyenne began building rapport with NF right away and learned about NF's challenging upbringing, which included bouncing from foster home to foster home starting at age 6.

**"NF had faced so much inconsistency and pain in her early years,"** shared Cheyenne. **"It was clear that she had a lot of unresolved trauma, but it was equally clear that she wanted to make a positive change in her life, especially for her baby."**

Throughout the course of their work together, Cheyenne and NF focused on building trust and creating a safe space for NF to share her experiences and challenges. NF revealed that after High School, she fell into a pattern of poor choices, including run-ins with the law. NF got pregnant, and although she knew the father, he didn't want to be involved in her pregnancy or her life. Despite this, she had two strong support networks: her foster parents and her current roommate.

Cheyenne shares that NF struggled with controlling her behavior, and she feared she might end up back in jail, which unfortunately happened. When she was incarcerated, Cheyenne made sure to stay in contact with her foster parents and provided them with regular updates and support.

When NF was released from jail, she confided in Cheyenne that she was considering running away with her baby, which prompted Cheyenne to share valuable resources with her to support her mental health, housing, and employment.

**"I knew that if NF ran, it could jeopardize the progress we had made. But with the right guidance and resources, NF began to see a different path forward,"** Cheyenne shared.

Cheyenne expressed her excitement about NF's progress stating, **"NF has made such huge strides. She started attending therapy twice a week and has also found a job at a local consignment store. She's enrolled in anger management classes and is committed to creating a better future for herself and her baby."**

Today, NF's baby is thriving, meeting all developmental milestones. NF continues to meet regularly with Cheyenne and enjoys engaging in evidence-based activities that are tailored to her needs as a young mother. **"I'm so thankful for the HOPES program. I don't know where I'd be without the support of Cheyenne,"** NF shared.

It's stories like NF's that remind us why the work we do is so important. With the right support, anything is possible.
