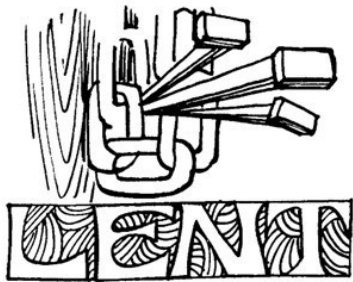

We are about to begin another lenten journey. This a journey with Christ that will lead to the cross, and then, on to victory over death in resurrection. It's that time of the year when conversations include the question, "What are you giving up for lent? And the response is usually what we consider to be one of life's indulgences: chocolate or dessert or pizza. Giving up something during lent goes all the way back to Jesus. Jesus gave up his life so we could enjoy forgiveness and new life. Because of Jesus' example, our lenten question and answer suggests that lent is a time of self-denial.

Self-denial is certainly a good spiritual discipline. It's important that we remember, though, the point of self-denial. The whole purpose of self-denial is to make space in our life for something else. Self-denial is to make space in our life for someone else. Self-denial as Christians practice it is to make space in our lives for God. We empty ourselves in order to be filled with God.

Self-denial might not sound like much fun. And so, I'd like to suggest that we see lent as a time to indulge. Lent is a time to gorge on the things of God! Lent is a spiritual feast, and we're invited to the banquet! In years past, lent was the time when people were prepared and instructed to receive the sacrament of baptism. People learned about the life,

death and resurrection of Christ, about scriptures, about the creed, about the commandments, about prayer, about the sacraments, about the traditions and worship of the church, and about living as a believer. People filled up on the things of God during their lenten baptismal instruction.

Every day, life puts before us a mixture of givens and options. We are expected to go to work or school. We need to spend a certain amount of time caring for our physical needs. We have responsibilities at home. Along with the givens, we also need to make choices about how we will invest ourselves. We can use our time for entertainment, or to participate in community organizations, or for self-improvement, or to attend a church function, and the list goes on.

Lent is an invitation to chose those things that are satisfying, truly satisfying, and to gorge on them. Jesus said, "I am the bread of life; anyone who comes to me shall not hunger, and anyone who believes in me shall never thirst." In Christ, God satisfies our human longings. Treat yourself during lent. Treat yourself to time, or more time, for prayer. Treat yourself to time with scripture. Treat yourself to worship. Treat yourself to meditation and reflection. Treat yourself to fellowship with other Christians. Treat yourself to the joy of serving another person. Treat yourself to quiet time in the presence of God. Indulge! Gorge! Enjoy the gentle, loving presence of God!

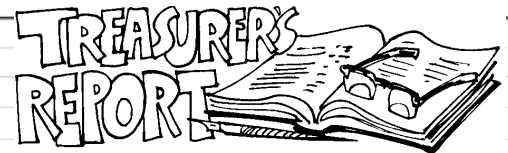

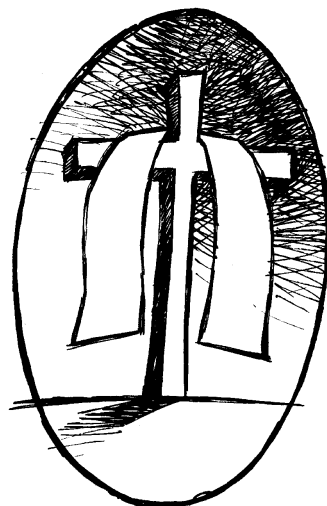

Season of Lent



March Article

LSI serves Iowans of all ages; families with newborns navigating parenthood, refugee and immigrant elders, and children of all ages. One of the most crucial populations LSI serves is children in middle and high school. April Howe of LSI shares the impact of LSI programming that she sees in schools across Iowa.

“I love it when a whole classroom of middle schoolers run down the auditorium hallway for an LSI class shouting ‘April!’ with excitement, ready to learn about healthy relationship skills and self-esteem,” said April Howe, a Program Supervisor for LSI’s Clinical Services team.

Our LSI Clinical Services team provides various local community programs in schools across Iowa. Whether it’s mental health therapy or programs providing teen pregnancy education, they all share the goal of wrapping care around adolescents at a local level.

Specifically, April and her team conduct two community programs in nine northwest Iowa counties: Community Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention (CAPP) and Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP).

CAPP supports and educates Iowa youth by providing sexual health and pregnancy prevention classes for healthy and successful relationships. PREP helps youth build social, emotional, and life skills to develop a positive sense of self and to connect with peers in their community. PREP utilizes the Teen Outreach Program and Wise Guys evidence-based curriculum.

“Thank you for teaching our class and taking time out of your day to come to our school. I learned a lot about healthy relationships and how to handle my anger and other emotions. You opened my eyes to my family’s habits and what I want to take with me when I have a family of my own.”

“The letters that high school students write to our staff about what they learned in class and how they will use the knowledge in their everyday life shows the programs’ tremendous impact,” said April. “We meet the youth where they are at, but also encourage healthy decision-making along the way, which plays a huge role in making prevention education successful.”

Furthermore, April’s team encourages conversation and participation by providing incentives in the classroom, such as packaged snacks and other LSI materials. “When it comes to engagement in the classroom, I always say, ‘When their stomachs are full, their brains are full,’” shared April with a smile. “Some students would skip school all day, but they show up to the last class of the day, taught by LSI. That, right there, is a win for my team.”

April’s team has seen significant success in response to their CAPP and PREP community programs. Based on a post-program evaluation, 96% of students in the CAPP program reported that they learned “some” or “a lot” that they didn’t already know about sexual health topics, and 53% agreed that they are now more likely to start conversations about these topics with others.

“Pregnancy rates have dropped over the last four years in many of our counties served, proving our services are making a difference in our communities,” said April. “Reaching the youth on their level and prioritizing prevention makes our program successful.”

Iowa Bishops Respond to False Allegations

February 6, 2024

Jesus said to him, “You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind,’ This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: ‘You shall love your neighbor as yourself.’” -Matthew 22:37-39

On Sunday, February 2, General Mike Flynn shared a post on X (formerly Twitter) that claimed money was being laundered through religious organizations and specifically named the “Lutheran” faith. The post contained a picture of a spreadsheet showing payments from the Department of Health and Human Services to Global Refuge (formerly LIRS) and to a number of Lutheran Social Service organizations across the country. Elon Musk commented “The @DOGE team is rapidly shutting down these illegal payments.”

The claims that these federal grants are illegal or that these federal grants are connected in any way to money laundering are complete lies. The falsehoods strike at the heart of our caring institutions and cast doubt on every Lutheran’s integrity.

Shutting down federal grant payments puts Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI) employees and their families at risk along with the clients and families that rely on the array of services provided including early childhood education and parental support, mental health counseling, behavioral health interventions for adolescents, services for people living with disabilities, foster care and adoption services and resettlement accompaniment and services for legally present immigrants and refugees. Currently, there are 190 legally documented people being resettled in Iowa and 108 of them are children. We must stand by our promise of support to these children and adults as they flee from their own countries.

Lutherans have been providing care for our neighbors in need through these agencies for generations. LSI has been serving Iowans for 160 years! We read about LSI’s great work in many of our church newsletters every month. We have a long tradition of supporting their work through generous donations of cash and in-kind gifts. We are right to be grateful and even proud of the work we do together with these agencies here in Iowa and across the country. Please don’t let one false and misleading post cast doubt on what you know from personal experience. Global Refuge and Lutheran Social Services (like LSI here in Iowa) bid on government contracts to help resettle legal immigrants in our country and in our state. LSI, also, bids on state and federal grants to sustain the other important programs that support Iowans. Contracts are awarded by the government and regularly audited. This work has taken place through administration after administration, no matter which political party holds power in our federal government. There is nothing illegal or unethical about this work. We expect our government to honor its contracts and pay people for honest work done in service to our country and our neighbors.

As ELCA Bishops serving the three Synods in Iowa, and as members of the LSI Board of Directors, we want you to be confident in the exemplary work and ministry of LSI and Global Refuge. We support the hard-working employees of these agencies especially during these unwarranted attacks and false assertions. We remain grateful for the many ways Lutherans in Iowa love the Lord our God and love our neighbors in tangible, caring, and helpful ways.

The ELCA remains committed to our core mission of feeding people who are hungry, caring for those who are sick, and advocating for justice, peace, and the dignity of all people. This has been the calling of the church for over 2,000 years, and that will not change.

Please tell the true stories about the work and impact of Lutheran Service in Iowa, Lutheran Services in America, and Global Refuge, so that together, we can spread the truth about the mission of caring in the name of Jesus Christ through these organizations and many others like them.

8. Adjournment: Christine moved; Phil seconded – motion passed to adjourn the meeting.



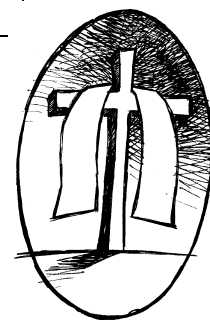
DON'T FORGET TO SPRING AHEAD ON MARCH 9!
